- I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.
- I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.
- I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.
- I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.
- I will leave all gates as found.
- I will build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.
- I will discard no burning material - matches, cigarettes, etc.
- I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.
- I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.
- I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.
- I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.
- I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.
- I will cooperate with field-trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.
- I will report to my club or federation officers, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.
- I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.

A BONE TO PICK

You may have read about it, possible seen it on the TV news or

may have even stumbled upon it while surfing the internet as I did. What I'm talking about is the real life story of Nathan Murphy, a commercial fossil hunter slash amateur paleontologist, who rocked the scientific community and public at large by unearthing perhaps the best preserved dinosaur in North America back in 2000. He now stands convicted in Federal Court of stealing fossils from public lands (BLM) in Montana.

His claim was that it was an honest mistake. The Federal prosecutor's claims were accurate, that this wasn't his 1st dance with the government and the laws of the land, that his willful disregard of the laws should qualify him to become the poster boy for the BLM.

Let there be no mistake among the public that the government and the legions of agencies which reputedly seek to preserve, protect and manage our right, title, and interest in our public lands will not tolerate the *For Profit Resource Hunting* by amateurs or professionals alike. Although I believe in playing by the rules, it is becoming increasingly difficult for amateur rock hounds to know exactly what those rules and regulations are beyond the often ambiguous and loosely defined terms and definitions associated with our hobby and in some instances our livelihood. This issue is complicated even further by geographical and regional differences in our country and the various management agencies involved in obtaining accurate information and or permits.

Policy decisions often are left to the regional or district administration. One only has to read of the above or the article in last month's newsletter entitled "This Can Happen To You" or the article in the July issue of Rock&Gem titled "CONFISCATED!" to know the war has begun right here in America.

THE BOLA TIE

The Bola (not bolo) tie (pronounced "boh-la"), is today known in much of the world, but probably is most prevalent in the southwestern United States. There are a lot of claims as to the origin of the Bola tie, but the one that is normally accepted starts in 1949 with Victor E. Cedarstaff of Wickenburg, Arizona. Vic was riding horseback when the wind blew off his hat. The band had come loose. Instead of putting it back on the hat he put it around his neck. When a friend saw him he remarked, "Nice tie you are wearing!"

That gave Vic an idea. He was a silversmith and had taught leathercraft, so he made a tie from the leather lacing and attached silver balls on the ends. Then he made a silver slide with a piece of turquoise on it and slipped it on the tie. This attracted attention and he began to get orders to make them for customers. He was unable to get a patent on the tie because such a slide arrangement was already in use.

A problem was to make the slide so it would slip yet not damage the leather. Eventually he designed a yoke which held the leather properly and eliminated the necessity of having to slip the tie over the head. Now he had something new and on this he was issued a patent.

He needed a name for the tie which would help popularize it and first called it a "Piggin Necklet", after the piggin string that the cowboys use. Some time later a friend who had been to Argentina showed Vic a device he had brought back called a "Bola". This was used in Argentina for catching cattle and it reminded Vic of the tie he had made. The name Piggin Necklet had never really caught on enough to hold the public interest, so Vic decided to call his tie a Bola. This popularized it and soon others began making similar neckware.

Please remember that these ties that rockhounds (and others) wear is not a bolo. A bolo is a kind of machet e knife used by the Filipinos. On April 22, 1971 the governor of Arizona signed into law a new section that states: The Bola Tie shall be the Official State Neckware." ---The Burro Express via The Palomar Gem, 11/93

Hearing loss affects about 28 million people in the US about 10 million of these people received this damage, in part, as a result of exposure to loud noises. More than 20 million Americans are exposed to hazardous levels of noise on a regular basis that could result in noise-induced hearing loss (NIHL). Occupational noise exposure is the most common cause of NIHL, but non occupational exposure, such as live or recorded high volume music, airplanes, automobiles and recreational vehicles, household tools and some appliances, are also major contributors to NIHL. Very loud sounds of short duration, such as an explosion, gunfire, or loud banging, can produce immediate, severe, and permanent loss of hearing. Longer exposure to less intense levels of sound over time, exacts a gradual toll on hearing, initially without the person's awareness. The louder the level of noise, and the longer the duration of exposure, the greater the potential for damage. How can we protect ourselves from this hazard? The best method is to eliminate or reduce the level of intensity of the noise source and the time of exposure. The next best prevention method is to wear hearing protection in the form of ear plugs (disposable or fitted) or ear muffs when exposed to noise. Rock hounds are most commonly exposed to noise while in automobiles or recreational vehicles on the way to collecting sites.

Some collecting sites contain industrial equipment and vehicles that can generate considerable amounts of noise. When at these sites it is best to wear the same level of protection that the workers at the site are wearing, as the employer has determined the level of protection required for his employees. Rock hounds also use hammers and even large portable gasoline engine powered diamond saws at collecting sites to recover specimens, and should protect their hearing with ear plugs and or ear muffs. Back in the shop, all rotating equipment, such as diamond saws, grinding wheels, rock hammers, hydraulic rock trimmers, etc., contribute to the noise level. Consider wearing ear plugs or muffs to prevent NIHL.

Reduce the effects of noise and enjoy collecting in 2001.
