Santaquin, Utah - Birdseye marble **26 April** - 1 3/4 hour drive

<u>Dugway, Utah</u> - Geode beds **17 May** - 3 hour drive

Rawlins, Wyoming - Banded Iron **14 June** - 5 ½ hour drive (overnight for some)

Brian Head, Utah (Cedar City) - Agate **19 July** - 4 hour drive

Wamsutter, Wyoming - Turritella **16 August** - 4 hour drive

Panguitch, Utah / Casto Canyon (near Bryce)

Agate, Limb Casts 20 September - 4 ½ hour drive (Overnight for some)

Henry Mountains - Agate, Wood, Coprolite, etc 9 - 13 October - 5 hour drive Year end trip.

Santaquin, Utah Field Trip Birdseye Marble, April 26th

The Club will be conducting a field trip on **Saturday, April 26th**, to collect Birdseye Marble south of Santaquin, Utah. Driving time from Ogden to Santaquin on I-15 south is approximately one and a half (1 ½) hours. The group will meet at the Maverick gas station located at Exit 244 at 10:00 AM and we will depart for the collection site **NO LATER THAN (NLT) 10:30 AM.** The collection area is only a couple of miles south of the Maverick station with Birdseye marble and other fossilized remnants being readily found.

Interesting Facts about Rocks and Minerals:

- *A <u>Mineral</u> is a naturally occurring, inorganic (composed of matter other than plan or animal) solid with a definite chemical composition made up from chemicals inside the earth. There are over 4000 known minerals, but only 30 are found abundantly on the earth's surface.
- *A <u>Rock</u> is a mass of one or more minerals. Rocks continuously transform, changing from one type of rock to another. They are naturally transforming in the presence of heat and pressure.

*Three main types of Rocks:

Igneous - formed by the solidification of magma (molten rock within the earth that solidifies or spews out of a volcano and is cooled. Ex. Granite, Diorite, Rhyolite, Obsidian, Basalt

<u>Sedimentary</u> - formed from pre-existing rocks or pieces of once living organisms which accumulate on the Earth's surface. They often have distinctive layering. Ex. Sandstone, Conglomerate, Limestone, Shale, Chert

<u>Metamorphic</u> - formed due to the transformation of pre-existing rocks in response to environmental changes like heat, high pressure and mechanical stress. Metamorphism- to change form.

Ex. Serpentine, Quartzite, Marble, Soapstone

- *Both rocks and minerals play crucial roles in construction, energy production, and technology.
- *Gold_is a pure inorganic substance. Which makes it a <u>mineral</u>, One of the most precious metals in the world. It is estimated that 80% of gold has not been discovered.
- *The Mohs Mineral Hardness Scale measures the hardness of a mineral. The device was invented by German mineralogist Friedrich Mohs.
- *Humans consider **gemstones** highly valuable due to their scarcity, beauty, and durability. There are about 100 of them. A gemstone's weight is measured in carats.

One carat is approximately 0.2 grams.

AMERICAN FEDERATION OF MINERALOGICAL SOCIETIES CODE OF ETHICS

- 1 I WILL respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without permission from the owner.
- 2 I WILL keep informed on all laws, regulations and rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.
- 3 I WILL, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.
- 4 I WILL use no firearms or blasting materials in collecting areas.
- 5 I WILL cause no willful damage to property of any kind, such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.
- 6- I WILL leave all gates as found.
- 7 I WILL build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.
- 8 I WILL discard no burning materials matches, cigarettes, etc.
- 9 I WILL fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock, etc.
- 10 I WILL not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.
- 11 − I WILL cause no damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.
- 12 I WILL practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the benefit of others.
- 13 I WILL support the Rock Hound Project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter, Please) and will lave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.
- 14 I WILL cooperate with Field Trip Leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.
- 15 I WILL report to my Club or Federation Officers, Bureau of Land Management, or other proper authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other material on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations and for public educational and scientific purposes.
- 16 I WILL appreciate and protect our heritage of Natural Resources.
- 17 I WILL observe the "Golden Rule", will use Good Outdoor Manners, and will at all time conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and Public Image of Rockhounds everywhere.
